Anderson (the Dean of the MIT School of Architecture) and Henry B. Hoover and that the school campus was one of the earliest examples of Modern school campuses in the United States. The GEC's activities include promoting home energy assessments and efficiency upgrades, renewable energy, solar systems, heat pumps, energy efficiency in building heating and cooling, electric vehicles, and electricity produced from clean renewable energy. The GEC does so by providing information and services to residents, working with other Town groups and officials, supporting Town-wide planning, and making recommendations for Town action.</p> <p>We currently have six members appointed by the Select Board and a dozen or so other volunteers who actively participate in our work of research, planning and public education.</p>	<p>The GEC would like a newly-constructed or renovated community center to exemplify how we as a society need to build going forward, in order to help mitigate the climate crisis. That would include at a minimum making the building all-electric and highly energy-efficient. Additional goals or elements to consider would include (1) solar panels to help "green the grid" by not selling any renewable energy credits generated (2) fast-charging capability for electric vehicles and (3) using construction materials that minimize "embodied carbon". The GEC would be glad to discuss/explore these suggestions in more detail.</p> <p>In connection with climate adaptation and resiliency, the CCBC should consider whether the center could also be used as a temporary shelter for persons endangered or displaced by an extreme weather event, such as a heat wave or flooding.</p>	Yes

We run both an In Town program for Pre-K through Grade 2 as well as a travel program (through the Boston Area Youth Soccer League) for grades 3 through 8. This year we are serving 267 children and we have approximately 35 parent volunteers that assist with coaching.	LYS utilizes the Hartwell Multi-purpose meeting room for our regular Board of Directors meetings as well as our bi-annual coaches meetings. As we think about the potential for a community center on the Ballfield Road Campus, we would welcome the opportunity to utilize the community center for our meetings. Additionally, as we transition away from the third-party training association that we have relied on in the past (due to ongoing staffing challenges) we see a need for meeting space (similar to the Multi-purpose room) where we will be able to host training sessions for our parent coach volunteers. These will be classroom style programs that will rely on the use of video sessions along with discussions. We would envision hosting these types of programs a few times during the summer months as well as at various intervals throughout the year. In addition to the above, if the community center were to incorporate a fitness component (i.e., small gym) we could envision periodically utilizing that, if available, to offer additional programming and training for our middle school participants. Similarly, as we look to foster a holistic approach to sport, we would also welcome the potential use of a demonstration kitchen where we could collaborate with nutritionists and some of our parents who work in the food industry, to provide programming to our participants around the importance of nutrition in sport and as part of their overall development and growth.
